### **Inform and Empower:**

Each term the students across the school take part in the Inform and Empower Cyber Safety and Digital Wellbeing program by participating in engaging and interactive live streamed incursions. These incursions are designed to help create safer and more positive online experiences for the students.

This term the students from Years Prep-6 participated in the live incursions focusing on safe screen time, digital footprints and cyberbullying.

Below is an overview of the incursions and some conversation starters for parents and carers to use at home.


**Foundation:** Students focussed on navigating the online world more safely. They discussed how not all places on the internet are safe and explored how trusted adults can help us stay safe when online. Trusted adults can be teachers, parents, grandparents and carers who keep us safe when we are on devices. They listen to us, believe in us, keep us safe and help us.



### Conversation starters for home:

Have you ever felt confused when you're having screen time? What did you do? Who are some trusted adults you can talk to?

**Years 1/2:** Students focussed on the importance of Digital Footprints. Students learned about the importance of creating strong user names and passwords and not sharing personal information online.





### **Conversation starters for home:**

Let's look at your username and passwords and profiles and see how safe they are. What should we do if someone in a game or app asks us for personal information such as your name, address, age, phone number or photos?

**Years 3/4:** Students focussed on developing strategies for navigating uncomfortable situations online such as seeking help, record/screenshot, report, block/change settings and taking a break. They explored what it means to be an upstander by letting a trusted adult know, reaching out to the person being impacted or calling it out online. It takes bravery to be an upstander.



#### Conversation starters for home:

Has a friend ever mentioned feeling uncomfortable or upset about something online? Aside from a parent, teacher or carer, where else could you go for help or support? eg other adults or Kids Helpline.

**Years 5/6:** Students focussed on Cyberbullying- navigating uncomfortable situations. Students explored strategies for being an upstander- sending a supportive message to someone, calling out hurtful actions directly or telling a trusted adult and where to seek help. They aslo discussed the importance of consent in the context of digital interactions, asking for and receiving permission from someone before sharing their private photos or personal information online.



### Conversation starters for home:

Can you think of a time when you or someone you know felt uncomfortable online? Have you ever accessed the Kids Helpline website?

Have you ever seen other people act as an upstander online? What did they do? Why do you think it is important to get consent before sharing someone's photo or video?

### Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL)

Our Prep students recently celebrated a very special milestone – 100 Days of Prep! To mark the occasion, the students enjoyed a Prep Camp Celebration Day, coming to school in their pyjamas, sharing a delicious breakfast together, brushing their teeth, and then getting dressed into their uniforms to begin their day.






This celebration was a wonderful opportunity for our Preps to demonstrate our school-wide expectations of being **safe**, **respectful**, **and responsible**. Students showed responsibility by independently getting themselves organised, brushing their teeth, dressing in their uniforms, and taking care of their belongings.

They demonstrated respect by listening attentively during the puppet show about

resilience and by supporting their friends throughout the day. And they kept themselves and others safe by following routines and moving carefully during each activity.

### The Resilience Project

### Why It's Good for Children to Be Bored

In today's "Screen Age," boredom often feels like something to avoid — but research shows it can actually benefit children's emotional wellbeing and resilience. Allowing kids to experience boredom encourages creativity, problem-solving, and unstructured play, all of which are essential for developing social, emotional, and communication skills.



Leah Stevenson from *The Resilience Project* explains that device-free time helps children process big feelings, connect with others, and build resilience. By contrast, constant screen use can numb emotions and limit opportunities for meaningful conversations.

Parents and carers can support children by role-modelling device-free moments and encouraging them to embrace "Boredom Busters" such as imaginative play, exploring their environment, or creating cubbies and cardboard inventions. While it may take practice, giving children space to discover their own fun can lead to deeper creativity, confidence, and connection.

### Time Is Love: Why Being Present Matters More Than Ever

In amidst all the busyness of life and the endless 'to-do' lists, often family time, time with our children can be lost or replaced by tasks that 'have to be done.'

Sometimes it can feel overwhelming to spend more time with the kids in an overcrowded schedule but it isn't about creating more pressure, it's about what makes the biggest difference-spending quality time to hear, see and be with them. your children do want your presence. You are big and important in their lives.

### So What Can I Do Right Now?

- 1. Create Moments, Not Events it might be as little as 10 to 15 minutes to share a joke, go for an ice-cream, a chat while on a short walk.
- 2. Have a Personal Parenting Interview in your family and ask these three questions-
  - What is going well?
  - What's not?
  - How can we do better?

you might be surprised by their answers and how they feel about being seen, heard and, indeed, being asked.

- 3. Be Interruptible sometimes these times come at what feels like inconvenient times, like bedtime or while reading a book. If they are reaching out, consider pausing and tuning in. These moments do matter.
- 4. Make Time Their Way

Each child connects differently. One might want to chat. Another prefers side-by-side activities like cooking or gaming. Follow their lead.

5. Remember: It's Not Forever

The days can feel long, but the years are short. Before we know it, they'll be grown. And what they'll remember most isn't how clean the house was, but whether we were there—really there. Just like dollars are the currency of our economy, connection (feeling seen, heard, and valued) is the currency of our relationships.

Parenting isn't about being perfect. It's about being present. In a world full of distractions and pressures, choosing to give our children our time is one of the most powerful ways we say "I love you."

So tonight, even if you're tired, pause for a moment. Ask a question. Play that card game. Sit on the edge of their bed and just listen.

Because in your child's eyes, love is spelled T-I-M-E—and that's what they'll remember.

- Friday 16th October 2026 Offers will be posted to prospective 2028 Year 7 applicants.
- Friday 6<sup>th</sup> November 2026 Final date for parents/carers to accept an offer made by a school.

### Second Hand Uniform - New Process

We would like to notify you that our current second-hand uniform process is being revised, as it has presented a number of challenges.

Over time, we've encountered several difficulties with our existing process - such as inconsistent inventory, volunteer workload, and limited sales opportunities, which have made it less effective than intended.

We will no longer sell uniforms on behalf of families. You are welcome to list and sell your items privately on platforms like Facebook, Marketplace or local school uniform groups.

All unsold uniform items previously left at school for sale have now been returned to families.

If in the future you would like to donate any official Rushford's Uniform items that are clean and in good condition, you're most welcome to do so. We will assess them and, on an as-needed basis, offer them for sale at a nominal fee. Any proceeds help us manage ongoing costs and support broader school programs.

Simply list your specific uniform requirements—such as size, garment type (jumper, shorts, dress, etc.) and we will review existing stock and let you know if we can help. If items are available, we will explain how you can collect or receive them. If nothing matches, we will keep your request on file in case items come in later.

### Student Levies AND School Fees are now OVERDUE

All student levies (\$420.00 per student) and School Fees (1,840.00 per Family) are now overdue. We would appreciate you attending to this matter if you have not already done so. Payment can be made over the phone by credit card or in person between 8:30am – 4:00pm. Should you be experiencing any difficulties finalising these payments please do not hesitate to speak to Joanne Webster.

### **Concessional Fee Policy**

The concessional fee policy was introduced to support families struggling to pay school fees. Concessional school fees are available to any family that meets the below eligibility criteria:

- Holding a valid HCC and eligible for CSEF
- Experiencing severe financial hardship
- Holding a DVA Gold Card
- Identified as refugees and holding an ImmiCard
- Of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander heritage

You will also be required to complete a form as a part of the process to determine eligibility. Should you wish further information re this funding or if you have questions as to whether you are eligible, please do not hesitate to contact the school and ask to speak to Joanne Webster.
